

Literature Contest Rules 2014 Alaska Migratory Bird Calendar

The goal of the Alaska Migratory Bird Calendar Contest is to encourage local Alaska students to learn about bird conservation.

There are 4 ways to win: **1. Local Contest.** Five local judges choose 24 local winners (12 poster and 12 literature), **2. State-wide Contest.** All local winners are sent to Anchorage for the state-wide contest. Five different judges select 24 state-wide winners (12 poster and 12 literature) and two Grand Prize winners to be printed in the 2014 calendar. **3. Manager's Choices.** The manager of your local FWS office selects one poster and one literature entry from the local winners and it is published (at a smaller size) in the calendar, and **4.** Every student that submits an entry receives a "Certificate of Appreciation."

Judges will be looking at: use of language, expression of theme, enjoyable to read, original concept, and biological accuracy.

Rules:

1. K-12 students (public, private or home schooled) residing in villages in or adjacent to the North Slope Borough and the following National Wildlife Refuges: Arctic, Yukon Delta, Togiak, Izembek, Alaska Peninsula, Becharof, Alaska Maritime, Selawik, Innoko, Kanuti, Koyukuk, and Nowitna and Northern Innoko (Kaiyu Flats) may enter. 2. All entries must be submitted to the closest U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service office, Attention: Calendar Contest at (Addresses of offices are on page 2 of the Entry Form)
3. All entries must be postmarked by Friday, February 8, 2013. Entries postmarked after this date will be disqualified.
4. Only one literature entry per student will be accepted in the literature contest. However, students may enter both literature and poster contests.
5. Literature entries must be **typed or handwritten neatly** in black ink on 8 ½" x 11" paper. **Illegible submissions will be disqualified.**
6. Try to limit the total number of English words to 60. If written in Yup'ik, Unangax, Inupiaq, Gwich'in, or Koyukon Athabaskan, an English translation must be attached to the entry. (The translation is not counted in the total number of words allowed.)
7. All entries must be original. No copying will be accepted.
8. Literature entries may be either poetry or prose and **MUST PERTAIN TO THE THEME. This year's theme is "Healthy Birds for Healthy Food."**
9. The purpose and spirit of the calendar is to convey **positive** conservation messages related to migratory birds found in Alaska. Literature focusing on "no hunting" or "no egging" messages is not appropriate and will be disqualified.
10. Teachers **must** review the student's writing so that misspelling and grammatical errors are corrected before submission (you may use spell-check and grammar-check in your computer as well). **Misspelled words will disqualify the entry.**
11. Young children and/or children with disabilities may get assistance from their teachers and parents to dictate their thoughts.
12. **Completed, legible entry forms MUST be firmly attached on the back of each entry (only page 1).** An entry form is provided and should be copied for each entry. This will ensure that every participant receives a certificate.
13. Student's name **must not** appear on the front of the entry but **should be neatly printed on the back** just in case the entry form is accidentally separated.
